Manaakitanga is all about caring and bringing out the best in all you do. Here is a list to start you off with how you see tikanga practices at the painting area that are reflective of manaakitanga. Children should be able to demonstrate manaakitanga through:

- Sharing paints with friends.
- Helping younger tamariki to hang up their artwork.
- Reminding tamariki to get their apron on first.
- Helping kaiako bring out the paints to the table. (setting up the area).
- Asking friend(s) to pass you the paint when they have finished.
- Reminding each other to horoi ringaringa (wash hands) when finished.
- Hanging up the apron when finished.

Ngā Taputapu: Equipment

1. Peita: paint
2. Paraehē: brush
3. Ipu wai: water container
4. Papa peita: Painting easel
5. Pēpa: paper
6. Pepamārō: cardboard
7. Ngā tae mātāmua: Primary colours
8. Maro: apron
9. Rauwhero: bronze, Hiriwa: silver,
Kōura: gold.
10. Taitapa: painting frame



Ngā tūmahi: Doing, Action Words

1. Peita (hia): paint it
2. Whakaranu (mia): mixing
3. Horoi (a): wash
4. Tou (a): dip into
5. Whakatārawa: hang up

Ngā rerenga kōrero: Action Phrases

1. Peitahia tāu pikitia.
Paint your picture.
2. Whakaranumia ngā peita mā me te pango.
Mixing the white and black paints together.
3. Toua te paraehe ki roto i te ipu wai.
Dip your brush into the water jar.
4. Whakatārawa tāu pikiti kia māroke.
Hang your picture to dry.
5. Horoia ngā paraehe.
Wash the brushes.



Ko Rakiwhiu Williams-Timothy
tēnei kei te peita ia.

6. Rakiwhiu whakaranumia ngā peita mā me te whero - ka puta mai he peita māwhero.
Rakiwhiu mixing the white and red paints together – to make pink paint.

Ngā rerenga kōrero: Everyday Phrases

1. He aha ngā taputapu mō te mahi peita?
What do you need to paint with?
2. He mea hei peita ... he pepa.
Something to paint on ... paper.
3. Ngā peita maha.
Lots of paint.
4. He maha ngā tae, pērā ki te āniwaniwa.
There are a lot of colours just like a rainbow.
5. Ka mahi koe i te aha 'name'?
What are you thinking about doing 'name'?
6. Whakaranumia kia nui ake ngā tae.
Mixing paints to get more colours.
7. Ka mōhio au ki te whakaranu i te pango me te mā, ka puta ko te kiwikiwi.
I know black and white make grey.
8. Tirohia Whaea Chrissy.
See, look at this Whaea Chrissy.
9. Ka pai Rawiri, he kiwikiwi whēuriuri rawa tēnā.
Well done Rawiri. That is a very dark grey.
10. Horoia tō paraie peita ki te ipu wai.
Use the water jar to wash your paintbrush.
